HABITAT FOR HUMANITY IN THE ASESSIPPI PARKLAND

On December 1st Steve Krahn, VP Regional Development for Habitat for Humanity Winnipeg, met with community members to share information on the Habitat for Humanity Program and how we could start a local chapter.

Habitat for Humanity is an international organization that was established in 1976. The organization has built over 500,000 homes in more than 90 countries helping more than 2.5 million people. Habitat for Humanity Winnipeg was formed in 1987 and currently works with six chapters located in Dauphin, Portage, Selkirk, Steinbach, Virden and Kenora. Along with its chapters it has built over 220 homes and helped more than 1,100 people. Their mission states: "By mobilizing volunteers and community partners, Habitat for Humanity Winnipeg works with people from all walks of life to build safe, decent, affordable housing for purchase by low-income working families."

Program Characteristics:

A Habitat home is paid for through sponsorship and fundraising and built by both volunteers and professional trades. The homes are energy efficient and built to quality standards. They are sold at fair market value with a mortgage agreement that allows for no down payment, no interest, no term and monthly payments of 25% of gross income. Each chapter has its own revolving account so that the money collected through homeowner mortgage payments goes back into the chapter to build the next house.

Who are Habitat Families?

Habitat families are ambitious, motivated and hard working individuals. They are low income working families that go through a comprehensive selection process based on their need, ability to pay and willingness to partner. A Habitat family will be required to perform 350 to 500 hours of sweat equity through work on their own home and volunteer community commitment.

Impact on Families and the Community:

Habitat homes provide stability and a wealth generation opportunity for the Habitat family. Research indicates that Habitat homeowners are more likely to be satisfied with their homes and neighbourhoods, and are more likely to engage in community activities. The new home provides an increased tax base and an increase of spending in the local economy. The mortgage payments are reinvested in the community through new Habitat homes.

How can we get involved?

To start a local chapter we need Leadership! The first step is establishing a steering committee and sub-committees. For a project to proceed we need to identify land and volunteers and begin raising project money through fundraising, donations, events, and grants. Habitat for Humanity Winnipeg will provide program support, accounting services, mortgage administration, legal charitable status, training, access to funding, a wealth of knowledge in house construction, house plans, a standardized warranty program and a volunteer safety training program.
